Brazos Firewise Plan

To make the Brazos safer we propose the Five-Year Goals below followed by more specific targets for 2023.

We were given a green light in March by the Captain and members of the BCVFD to begin implementing this plan.

FIVE YEAR GOALS TO 2028 - THE BIG PICTURE

- 1) The Brazos will be recognized as a leading neighborhood in fire mitigation in Northern New Mexico.
- 2) Raise Fire awareness among Brazos property owners as measured by:
 - a. a 25% increase in awareness, and/or
 - b. 25% increase in Firewise event participation and/or
 - c. a 20% increase in the number of owners who have performed a substantial reduction of fuel or adopted Firewise property owner guidelines survey
- 3) NM 512 will be mitigated and improved to be a safe evacuation route as well as the first ¼ mile on designated public and private roads that feed into NM 512 for participating subdivisions.
- 4) Sufficient funds will be identified to complete this plan by 2028 and support annual maintenance beyond 2028. Identify funds and other resources annually from 2023 through 2028 to (1) mitigate fire danger; (2) improve evacuation routes and access along NM 512, and adjacent public roads, (3) establish a small seed funds to support initial neighbor to neighbor efforts to build awareness and stimulate action among residents (limbing/chipping/hauling) and (4) Creation of additional safe zones and fire breaks.
- 5) Safe zones (shelter in place areas) and firebreaks will be identified, created and known to the residents. These efforts will necessitate working with the BCVFD, State Forester and private parties to designate and improve zones and fire breaks.
- 6) By 2028 document significant progress toward moving the Brazos neighborhood from extreme danger to moderate danger (or greater actions, if moisture and weather conditions permit)
- 7) Demonstrate a significant increase in the number of monetary contributions to BCVFD donations from the Brazos neighbors (target a minimum of 10 % increase in the number of neighborhood contributions annually.) It is hoped that the dollar amount increases as well, but the number of contributions measure participation.
- 8) A system for fire notification (reverse 911) will be developed and advertised to resident

We are making great progress on 2023 goals with the help of 8 subdivision leaders. All efforts to date are privately funded.

2023 Goals: <u>STATUS</u>

Identify a Firewise team member for each participating subdivision. Planning team members will educate themselves on existing Firewise efforts to date.

- Target at least 3 large subdivisions for surveying and participation and identify a volunteer representative from each to assist in the development of a fire survey to be mailed to parcel owners.
 Surveys out to 8 of 10 subdivision leaders
- 3. Distribute a letter and survey to parcel owners in each subdivision. Over 130 mailed
- 4. Assemble a database of information from returned surveys on Firewise guidelines, fire mitigation, and their willingness to help neighbors in need. From this data develop an action plan which will be shared with the BCVFD.
 Have database of 878 owners, address,
- 5. Identify a point person responsible for knowing fire grant application submission dates and communicating information to participating subdivisions. <u>Pending</u>
- 6. Develop a plan for mitigation efforts and road improvements for NM512 especially the hairpin curves just below road 1753, and, begin mitigation efforts as practical in 2023. Identify state agency responsible for such efforts and appoint a liaison to gather status reports and offer information to VFP for accountability and action. MMDOT contact complete, NMDOT exploring.
- 7. If resources can be found, develop a Brazos Canyon Volunteer Fire Department website with links to other organizations whose mission is fire mitigation and fire prevention; website would provide quick and easy access to Firewise materials, evacuation plans and current Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP); provide listing of community events and annual conferences to broaden community awareness of current and future fire dangers. Compiling, point person TBD
- 8. Using guidance from BCVFD, identify and notify neighbors of alternative access for major subdivisions to evacuate. Work with VFD and others as necessary to identify access; report to neighborhood organizations on those safe zones for notification of their members. TBD
- 9. Identify Funding (state grants or private funding) for 2023 if possible to: THIS APPLICATION
 - Begin to Improve access first on 512 and then on first quarter mile of adjacent public roads
 - **b.** Identify, label and clear safe zones in the three target neighborhoods **X**
 - c. If funding is available to assist private owners, identify a criterion for selecting highest priority and equitable distribution
- **10.** Initiate at least 2 events to stimulate "hands on" neighbor involvement in removing fuels from the Brazos such as limbing/Chipping/hauling and/or dumping. Other alternatives may include chipper drop off location, chipper on site visits or other.

- 11. Begin coordination efforts with BCVFD, State Forester, NORA, State Highways, State Police, etc. to understand the goals of the Brazos Firewise efforts and their respective roles. Started
- **12.** Establish a tracking system to monitor and report on all Firewise participation, and resources including funds, events, activities, participation, staff and volunteer hours. **Started**
- 13. Identify funding sources (state grants or private funding) for 2023/2024, if possible, to
 - a. Expediate planning and implementation of easier access to 512 and then on the first quarter mile of adjacent public roads.
